Dear Donors, Alumni and friends of the University,

I am pleased once again to present our annual report to you.

I should start by mentioning that, in part, this report will celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Radford University Foundation. I just looked at our 1983 audit, and our total assets were \$545,000. By 1993, our total assets had grown to more than \$6 million, and in 2003, we had over \$33 million in assets. In recent years, our total assets have consistently exceeded \$100 million each year. While that is not enough to meet all our needs, it is still growth to be proud of. This growth also allows the Foundation to fund nearly \$3 million a year in scholarships.

If you would like to help us grow our assets further, I encourage you to contact Vice President Penny Helms White or one of her team in University Advancement.

During the last couple of reports, we have highlighted progress on The Highlander Hotel Radford. This year, we will do the same on a lesser scale. Our new general manager, Scott Marn, and his team are making great strides. The Bee and Butter, located on the rooftop, just redid its entire menu to make it more affordable and a better fit for Southwest Virginia. The management company is now Scholar Hotels, which only manages hotels in communities with a college or university. Scholar appears to be a great fit for Radford, and we are excited to work with them.

I should mention that the rates at The Highlander are typically very reasonable for a hotel of this caliber. However, there always will be 10 to 12 weekends a year when demand goes way up. These weekends include Commencement, Homecoming and major events in the region. On those occasions, the hotel must charge much more in an effort to make sure our investors are appropriately compensated. We appreciate your understanding.

I recently had the opportunity to travel to New York City with the student investment (SMIPO) group. We were joined by Professor Abhay Kaushik and Scott Hall of University Advancement. Collectively, we had a great trip and met with people at both the New York BNY Mellon and Goldman Sachs offices. This trip reminded me why my team and I are here in the first place.

Finally, I must thank Michelle O'Connor for her terrific two-year run as board chair. It has been a great pleasure working closely with her, and I am confident that we both look forward to the transition in June when Jay Kenslow is expected to take over the role.

The Grand Opening and Story of The Highlander Hotel Radford

Spring 2023 marked a milestone for the City of Radford and the addition of a new landmark changing the skyline. On April 4, the city and campus communities celebrated the opening of The Highlander Hotel Radford with a ribbon-cutting.

The Highlander Hotel Radford is a six-story destination hotel and conference center inspired by the Scots-Irish origins of Southwest Virginia but with a modern twist. It features 124 rooms.

including optional adjoining rooms and four apartment-style suites.

"This is a very special place for experiences such as conferences, family events, and community celebrations region-wide," said Radford University President Bret Danilowicz on the day of the ribbon cutting. "From homecoming to commencement, sporting events, and alumni events, I know these halls will be filled with energy, and I can't wait to see it all spring to life."

It sprang to life quickly and has since been a destination for Highlander alumni and friends and an integral part of the city for dining and socializing.

The Highlander Hotel Radford has two restaurants. The Bee & Butter rooftop restaurant and bar features a menu of locally sourced ingredients and offers views of the Blue Ridge Mountains and the Radford University campus. The Highlander Red Provisions offers breakfast and lunch, as well as a coffee



bar serving locally sourced Red Rooster Coffee.

"Our first year as in any new business, is about learning what the customer or in our case-guests are hoping to experience. Through this learning curve, we have had some great successes including a sold-out homecoming weekend, a scotch-tasting on the rooftop to celebrate Highlander Days, and many Big South teams choosing our location for their overnight stay. In addition, we hosted several local organizations in our event space including the Radford Chamber of Commerce annual gala," said Tara Talerico, director of sales for The Highlander Hotel Radford. "I think the executive team is most proud of how the Highlander team has come together over the first year with

many team member changes and new concepts, we have continued to put the guest experience first."

The hotel has more than 6,000 square feet of event space, including a 4,000-square-foot ballroom that will accommodate 250-300 people for meetings and up to 220 for weddings. A 500-square-foot executive board room resides in the hotel with space for private dining for up to 20 people.

Every inch of the hotel has been put to good use in its first year. Looking ahead to 2024 and beyond, the hotel plans to add new items to the menu at Bee & Butter, include theme nights at Red Provisions, and host even more alumni and friends as more people discover this Radford treasure.









Adam Stapleton learned a lot in his first year at Radford University. He delved into his major, cybersecurity, and his minor, Appalachian studies. And, as he enthusiastically got involved with campus activities, he learned a big lesson about overcommitment.

"This financial support for the second year in a row will allow me to focus hard on my studies and involvement so one day I can give back to this region all it has given to me. 50 YEARS OF THE RADFORD UNIVERSITY FOUNDATION

Since 1973, the Radford University Foundation has advanced the mission and strategic priorities of Radford University—spanning the tenures of five university presidents. During that time, the foundation stewarded millions of dollars in private funds, providing life-changing opportunities to generations of students and faculty, opening significant avenues of new learning through academic program enhancements, and supported improvements to facilities across the campus in Radford and at learning locations in Roanoke and beyond.

Established during the tenure of Radford's fourth president, Donald Dedmon, the foundation was created to support the university's unprecedented growth in campus size, curriculum, and student population happening at the time. Under Dedmon's leadership, Radford became a co-educational institution in 1972 and transitioned from college to university status by the end of that decade. During the 1980s, the student population expanded to more than 9,000 and eventually grew to over 11,000 by the 1990s.

As the foundation grew in step with the university, it managed gifts ranging from cash donations to bequests of land and buildings. The foundation's judicious administration of these financial assets played a key role in Radford's evolution from a small, single-sex regional college to the innovative, student-centered university it is today.

The work of the foundation can be seen in many of the landmarks that are readily identifiable on Radford's main campus, including the Governor Tyler House, where the university president

lives with his family, and the Sandra C. Davis and William C. Davis College of Business and Economics, as well as The Highlander Hotel Radford and the Selu Conservancy along the Little River.

Additionally, the foundation plays a significant role in funding athletics through the Radford University Athletic Foundation, expansion of educational opportunities at Radford University Carilion and the Roanoke Higher Education Center in Roanoke, student housing for those in need, university events on campus and in the surrounding community, and much more.


The foundation also has made an indelible impact on the thousands of people it has touched over half a century. By carefully managing gifts from Highlander families and friends, the foundation offers close to 600 scholarships annually, totaling nearly \$3 million. This investment in Radford University's future has made the dream of a college education possible for so many who otherwise could not afford it.

The foundation also recognizes the Highlander faculty and staff each year for the exemplary work they do to prepare the next generation of teachers, business and healthcare professionals, nonprofit leaders, and elected officials. Six awards are presented annually to faculty and staff, including:

- The Donald N. Dedmon Distinguished Teaching Professor Award recognizes and rewards outstanding teaching.
- The Distinguished Creative Scholar Award recognizes significant original contributions to the body of knowledge in academe and rewards contributions that significantly impact effective classroom teaching.
- The Distinguished Service Award recognizes faculty who have contributed substantial service to the University over a sustained period.
- The Distinguished Faculty Advising Award, which recognizes and rewards teaching faculty who excel in their role as academic advisors to undergraduate or graduate students.

- The Anna Lee Stewart Award for Contributions to Faculty Development, recognizes faculty and staff who have contributed substantially to the professional development of their colleagues.
- The Award for Administrative and Professional Excellence. which recognizes administrative and professional faculty for distinguished leadership and/or superior service in their area(s) of professional activity within the university.

Simply put, Radford University would not be what it is today without the invaluable support of the Radford University Foundation. The dedication of the foundation staff and its board of directors has helped our community ascend to new heights in remarkable ways. After 50 years, the foundation is still going strong and will continue to be an important part of how the university overcomes challenges and capitalizes on opportunities in the future.



BEYOND SCHOLARSHIPS



In addition to its support for student education, the Radford University Foundation is committed to recognizing and awarding the dedication and efforts of the university's outstanding faculty. The foundation annually presents awards to honor selected faculty's teaching methods, student and peer support efforts and research initiatives.

The Donald N. Dedmon Distinguished Teaching Professor Award recognizes and rewards outstanding teaching. The 2023 honor went to Stephen Owen, Professor of Criminal Justice. Owen encourages student success on an academic and professional level

by emboldening them to be problem solvers and critical thinkers. "Teaching is not a job, or a profession, or simply one of many professorial tasks," Owen explained. "Teaching is a lifestyle. Each time I walk into a classroom, it is in hopes of lighting a spark within myself and my students."

The foundation's Creative Scholar Award recognizes significant original contributions to the body of knowledge in academia and rewards contributions that significantly impact effective classroom teaching. The 2023 award was presented to Professor of Political Science Tay Keong Tan, who is known

on campus for the trajectory-changing experiences he provides students through transformative experiences.

The Distinguished Service Award recognizes faculty who made substantial service contributions to Radford University over a sustained period. Katie Hilden, a professor in the School of Teacher Education and Leadership, received the 2023 award.

The foundation's Distinguished Faculty Advising Award rewards and recognizes teaching faculty who excel in their roles as academic advisors to Radford's undergraduate and graduate students. The 2023 award was given to

Assistant Professor of Biology Sarah Foltz, who has a well-deserved reputation for excellence in mentorship.

The Anna Lee Stewart Award for Contributions to Faculty Development recognizes faculty and staff who have made substantial contributions to their colleagues' professional development. Heather Keith received the 2023 honor. Keith is a Professor of Philosophy and serves as executive director of faculty development, providing leadership to the Center for Innovative Teaching and Learning (CITL).

The Award for Administrative and Professional Excellence recognizes administrative and professional faculty for distinguished leadership and/or superior service in their areas of professional activity within Radford University. Avraham Boruchowitz, director of Environmental Health and Safety on campus, received the honor in 2023.

Recognizing Radford faculty who go above and beyond in and outside the classroom is important to attracting top academic leaders to our campus community. Their enormous impact benefits our Highlander students as they seek and obtain knowledge from faculty in classrooms and labs and through vital field experiences. Society additionally benefits from these scholars as they continue research into important issues.

Another excellent example of the foundation's support and recognition of faculty is its annual Dalton Eminent Scholars program and the faculty awards that arrive through the endowment.

The recipients of the 2022-2023 Dalton Eminent Senior Scholar Awards were Steven Fesmire, Ph.D., Professor and Chair of the Department of Philosophy and Religious Studies, and Professor of English Rick Van Noy, Ph.D.

Zachary Collier, Ph.D., an Assistant Professor in the Department of

Management, received the foundation's Dalton Rising Star award.

Each faculty winner receives \$10,000 to fund a scholarly project and a \$5,000 award following its successful completion. Each year, recipients are encouraged to include student investigators throughout their exploration, providing opportunities for greater excellence in their chosen fields.

Recipients of the Dalton Eminent Senior Scholar Award, the university's highest faculty honor, must be associate or full professors at Radford University for a minimum of three academic years.

The Rising Star award is given to one faculty member each year who shows extraordinary promise for excellence with creative scholarship or research. Nominees must be in no more than their sixth year of continuous service as a full-time faculty member at a higher education institution and in at least their third year of continuous service at Radford.

"It is wonderful that the recipients of this year's Dalton Eminent Scholar Award have creatively shared their expert knowledge with students at Radford University," said President Bret Danilowicz, Ph.D. "Dr. Fesmire's work on the role of ethics in society inspires students through examples informed from his global travels. Dr. Van Noy blends his storytelling talents with curiosity about the natural world. Dr. Collier engages students through advancing their understanding of how data is used in risk management. Each recipient is a gifted teacher and scholar."

The Dalton Eminent Scholars Fund, which provides financial support for the prestigious awards, was originally established in the late 1980s and early 1990s to honor United States District Judge Ted Dalton and former governor of Virginia John Dalton. Through a grassroots fundraising campaign, more than \$700,000 was raised for the endowment, which now has funds totaling \$2.2 million.


